

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

As I write in the early days of 2026, Lutherans are far more prominent in the news than usual. Since 1 in 10 ELCA Lutherans live in the Twin Cities of Minnesota, our siblings up north have been at the center of the movement calling for an end to the unchecked power of immigration officers in their neighborhoods. One year ago, there were false claims on social media that the government was making "illegal payments" to Lutheran Social Services. Of course those were legitimate payments in the form of grants and contracts for services like healthcare for the homeless, refugee resettlement, and mental health programs.

What are Lutherans doing when we're not in the news? The pages that follow give a glimpse. We gather for worship to remember God's promises. We teach our children the stories of our faith and trace the implications of those stories for life today. We serve our neighbors. We share the joys and sorrows of life with one another. We do the everyday work of building a community grounded in God's love revealed in Jesus.

We have every reason to be proud of the Lutheran Christians who've made the news over the last year and every reason to believe the stuff that has formed them into occasionally bold witnesses for the kingdom of God is the same stuff that's forming us at Resurrection.

I thank God for the gifts you bring to this community of faith and for our shared witness to the truth that God means for the whole world to be a place to belong.


Allocated grant funding in 2025 was \$7,000.
